California's \$20 Fast Food Wage Law Is Hurting the Workers and Families It Was Meant to Help

Fast food jobs are SHRINKING in California—while neighboring states hold steady.

- Seasonally-adjusted data from the Bureau of Labor Statistics and <u>Federal Reserve Bank of St. Louis</u> show that <u>California's quick-service restaurants have LOST 33,047 jobs</u> since September 2023 when AB 1228 was signed into law.
- Meanwhile, fast food jobs in Oregon and Nevada have grown during the same period.

 California's <u>fast food employment</u> is <u>now at its lowest sustained growth rate</u> since the Great Recession, barring the COVID-19 pandemic.

Fast food workers are losing hours—and paychecks.

- A <u>recent analysis</u> shows that California's non-tipped restaurant workers—many in fast food—have <u>lost up</u>
 <u>to five hours of work per week</u> since the \$20 wage took effect in April 2024.
- That's a <u>loss of up to 250 hours per worker per year—or seven weeks of work</u>—and thousands of dollars in lost wages.

>> Food prices are climbing.

 A <u>report</u> by the Berkeley Research Group found that food prices at California's fast food restaurants have surged <u>by 14.5% since September 2023</u>—nearly double the national average of 8.2%.
